SHORT TERM EFFECTS

Brain

Memory loss, insomnia

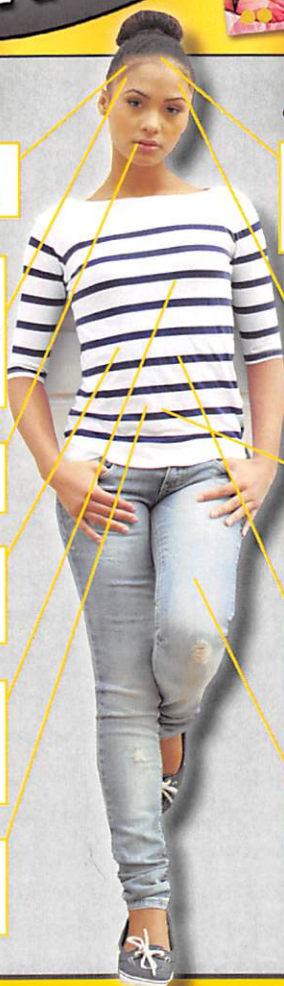
Stomach pain

WHAT DOES IT LOOK LIKE? Bath salts appear as a white or tan-colored powder form. Sometimes, it's sold in packages labeled "bath salts" or "plant food" and even says "Not for human consumption".

STREET NAMES:

Arctic Blast, Blue Magic, Cloud 9, Cloud 10, Fake Cocaine, Wicked X, Ivory Fresh, Ivory Wave, Lady Bubbles, Snow Leopard, Stardust, Vanilla Sky and white Dove



FACTS ABOUT BATH SALTS:

- Bath salts have been linked to serious health problems such as liver and kidney failure.
- Fake Cocaine is sometimes sold in packets labeled “bath salts” or “plant food”.
- On July 10, 2012, the President of the United States signed the Synthetic Drug Abuse Prevention Act of 2012. Synthetic compounds commonly found in bath salts, or synthetic cocaine, were banned, placing them under Schedule I of the Controlled Substances Act.
- Regular users of bath salts say that they build up a resistance to fake coke: over time, they need to use more and more to feel high .
- Sometimes, bath salts are sold in packages labeled “plant food”.
- The intense effects you experience when you’re “coming down” from high doses

Refusal Tips

There are a million reasons to say no to fake coke: It’s dangerous. It makes you paranoid and anxious, and it can make you lose touch with reality.

So what do you say when someone offers you bath salts? Try one of these:

- “No thanks. That stuff makes you crazy.”
- “No way! Do you even know what that stuff is?”
- “Nah!. That stuff is dangerous.”
- “I’ll pass. I’ve heard that stuff makes you paranoid.”



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
